Through the influence of friends made in Crockett Hall and the Navy ROTC, Jonathan Witter '82 came to know the bonds of the True Gentleman. "Having the entire membership of New York Epsilon Chapter living in the scenic 12 Myrtle made a nice micro-society and a home away from home environment. It was always great to return home from the shuttle, walk up the front walk, and open the door to the warmth of the house and the brotherhood."

As an undergraduate, Jerry was strongly influenced by the friendships he built through daily dinners, singing after initiation ceremonies, and participating in the National John O. Moseley Leadership School. He took on leadership positions such as chronicler, social chairman, pledge educator, and eminent archon. It allowed NYEP to focus all the spare time to build a stronger brotherhood and to commit more hours toward philanthropy and community service.

Now that we're at the end of the semester, I can say that we have absolutely done just that. We have truly prospered and become a better, stronger brotherhood these last five months. With 40 undergraduate actives, we've become a very close-knit group with no cliques or subgroups. We welcomed in a great class of 17 new members, bringing us up to a 58 total this upcoming spring. We're inspired to continue our intramural sports leadership after finally getting the Barker Trophy back in our hands. Our health and safety inspection received the best score out of all chapters on campus with an outstanding 98.77%. In reality, the RPI sanctions were a blessing in disguise because they allowed us to focus on the house and improve ourselves, our operations, and our brotherhood. I'm handing over the reins of New York Epsilon to Andrew Dumont, who will lead the chapter through the spring 2019 semester. I have complete faith and confidence that Andrew will do great things for this house.

RPI CREATES GREEK LIFE TASK FORCE TO ASSESS AND RECOMMEND ENHANCEMENTS

ver the past couple of months, RPI has Utaken action to form a Greek Life Task Force to review and develop outcomes on how to strengthen the community. Principles to guide their work are sustainability, community, and citizenship and these include reviews in 10 topic areas. While it has been a challenging process with the suspension of social events with alcohol, having Greek chapter houses be dry for the semester, and deferring rush until October 19, some areas of concern for housing were things we were proactively pursuing with our renovation project started years before the formation of the Task Force. We do feel confident that the RPI Greek community will be stronger on the back side of this if the stakeholders are organized and can have constructive dialogue with the RPI administration.

We believe that NYEP will be well positioned to succeed in any new environment that will evolve to prioritize and recognize chapter accomplishments for chapter operations, housing environments that foster living and learning, and member leadership development. Indeed, the actives were one of the most successful in recruitment with 18 new members, the second largest out of 25 fraternities. Jack Conlin '20, NYEP alumni relations chairman and newly elected IFC president for 2019, has served on the GLTF discussion panels. The culture for chapter operations, house maintenance, and healthy and safe choices for social and living conditions remain a forte of NYEP and the LAE House Corporation relations to the members and the chapter house.

The report of findings and recommendations was supposed to be out by the time of this writing, but alas, RPI has been running late on a number of actions with the GLTF. The outcomes will be out for community comment and will be discussed early in the spring semester.
