FAQ's:

1. Will living at the house be distracting to academics?

Academics are taken very seriously at SAE. Study hours go in effect starting at 7 P.M. on weekdays and there are two study rooms in the house specifically designated for school work. Living at the house also provides a strong academic network where younger brothers can ask for help from older brothers that have already taken a course.

2. How does transportation work between the house and campus?

The CDTA bus picks people up and drops them off right in front of the house and under the campus footbridge. Buses run all day long, seven days a week, and come every 45 minutes.

3. Who cooks the dinners?

At the beginning of every semester, five brothers are selected by the house steward based on cooking ability (we have some pretty good cooks) to cook once per week. Theses brothers are paid \$25 per meal that they prepare.

4. Who maintains the house?

The house manager and house steward, along with assistance from the alumni board, are responsible for the upkeep of the house. It is their responsibility to oversee cleaning, repairs, and capital improvements for the entire house. The kitchen is cleaned daily and the entire house is cleaned weekly.

New York Epsilon Meal Plan

The food plan at NYEP serves to provide live-in brothers with three meals a day, as well as snacks and drinks for anytime. The house is kept constantly stocked with the essentials such as milks, fruit, breads, cereals, and a full assortment of other breakfast and lunch options including a large selection of fresh deli meats, soups and other preparable foods.

Dinners at the house are prepared and served Sunday through Thursday. An effort has recently been made to create a better tasting, balanced and varied menu. A couple examples of the meals served at the house include: baked ziti, meatballs, salad and garlic bread; stuffed pork tenderloin, roasted potatoes and asparagus.





Responsibilities of Brothers that live in the house:

- Financial Obligations All bills are expected to be paid on time as set by the treasurer. Flexible payment plans are available.
- Cleaning Assignments Every brother is assigned a different room in the house that they are expected to clean weekly and this is enforced by the house manager.
- Kitchen Crews The kitchen is cleaned three times a day according to a crew schedule. Every brother is expected to complete one or two kitchen crews per week.
- Respect for the house Every brother that lives in the house is expected to clean up after themselves at all times. Respect for house property is also strictly enforced by the president, house manager, house steward, and the executive council.
